Canberra Excursion Recount

Monday 7th November Journey-Settling In Today was the day the school and I went to Canberra. We all piled into Bernie's bus, it took a bit of getting used to being in that cramped space for so long. Some of the towns we went through were Bathurst,

Cowra, Yass, Boorowa and some others I can't remember the names of, in Cowra we stopped at the Japanese gardens and we also stopped at a park in Yass.

When we got to the YHA Mr G told us to unpack so we unpacked until Mr G called us to have dinner. For dinner we had corn soup, chicken with noodles and vegetables and for dessert we had jelly. After we ate we went for a walk and saw lots of war memorials. Tuesday 8th November Mint, Questacon and Cockington Green Today we went to Questacon and the Mint. Firstly we went to Questacon (Its proper name is the nation science and technology centre.) Once we arrived at Questacon we had to wait for it to open. Once it was open we all had to go up a ramp which led to the exhibits, the exhibits were named and numbered. The things I enjoyed most were the Drop (which is like a giant slide engineered to make you feel like you're in zero gravity) the earth quake lab and this thing involving eggs. At the mint we went

and looked at the history of coins and how they came to be. We also saw a robot in the factory named Titan and we got to see a machine stamp a one dollar coin which we got to keep. This evening we went to Cockington Green which is sort of a mini model English village, it also has famous monuments. Two of the things I enjoyed most were the steam train ride and the mini automated trains and some of the interesting facts I learnt today were that Cockington Green was created by one family. Another thing I learnt was that if you fill a balloon with water and put it to a flame it won't burst because the water absorbs the heat and that coins date back thousands of years. Wednesday 9th November The Australian War Memorial, National Zoo, Aquarium & Black Mountain Tower When we arrived at the War Memorial there were a few statues to look at. One was of Simpson and his donkey, another one was of Weary Dunlop. Once we got in to the War Memorial we split up into groups, we didn't get to see the whole

memorial but the things we did get to see were pretty cool. One of the things I learnt was that the life raft of the HMAS Sydney had nobody on it and only one body was found. The next stop was the zoo and aquarium. We saw lots of animals such as penguins, lions, fish, sharks, tigers, a wombat, a koala, birds, snakes, lizards and alligators. The last tourist attraction we went to see was Black Mountain Tower, it wasn't very good in the glass viewing area but the open viewing area was spectacular. The only complaint I have about the open viewing was it was freezing!

HISTORY SNIPPET

An extract from a current Sydney Morning Herald sets forth briefly some of the operating difficulties:

> "The miner has to dig a quarry out - a platform. on the hillside where he intends to sink his shaft, and he has then to build a shed for his whim to put up a blackamith's shop and other erections. As a rule the first 130 ft. have to be sunk through broken ground filled with enormous boulders, and in some cases the sinking is through hard rock at a cost from £5 - £8 per foot. In most of the works every inch has to be brought away by blasting, and in one tunnel (King's and Hudson's) penetration could only go at one foot per week and that with three shifts of men working the clock round. . . . labour in dark conditions aided by 2 candles . . men needed courage and strength and perseverance.

Just as important was the capital required to provide the necessary materials for buildings, crushing machinery, rolling stock, tools, piping, pumping equipment and chemicals, among other requireand infers important reasons for the exodus from the diggings as gold output fell per unit of input.
