



History Snippet



AUSTRALASIAN POST 18TH OCTOBER 1951 (courtesy Tony Power)



You don't need a magnifying glass to see the "free gold" richly peckling this quartz the engineer in charge is showing visitors.

A large Melbourne company Devon Gold N.L., formed by the principals of one of the largest sharebrokers and underwriters in Australia, Ian Potter and Co., together with representatives of overseas capital, has been granted an option to work the

Devers - Holtermann Nugget Mine and fifty other leases in the same vicinity.

The largest single specimen of gold ever recorded anywhere 4ft. 9in. high, 2ft. 2in. wide, and weighing 630lb. — came from this mine, worked by the partners Beyers and Holtermenn, in 1872.

TILL END lies on a western spur of the Great Dividing Range, 53 miles north-west of important provincial city of Bathurst. The country around mu End, first opened by the explorer John Otley, was originally part of a huge cattle station.

o The gold rush at Hill End come as a direct result of Hargreaves' strike at Ophir. It reached its peak between 1851 and 1878.

mAte first, prospectors concentrated only on alluvial, or surface mining, washing the gold rom creeks and watercourses. were followed suropeans by whose Oriental animese. tionce found them gold in was which the others had indoned in disgust.
